

Spotlight on a Member

Craig McPherson

My first taste of weather started when I enlisted in the Air Force in 1983 and since then I never left it or it never left me. My Air Force assignments consisted of two tours in Germany and three stateside assignments in Albuquerque, NM where I met my wife Mollie of 23 years; Riverside, California and Tucson, Arizona where I retired from the Air Force six years ago this coming July. I came to Wichita, KS in February 2005 to work as a Meteorologist Technician at McConnell Air Force Base. Among my duties as meteorologist technician, I issue weather warnings, watches and advisories for the base, prepare flight weather briefings to the aircrews and preparing a forecast for the base in collaboration with our regional weather hub in Shreveport, LA. After accepting the job offer for McConnell, I was thinking to myself, what is there to do in Wichita? To my surprise, there is plenty to do here and surrounding areas.

Amidst of my assignments, my temporary assignments include two three month tours to Saudi Arabia, one in Riyadh and the other in Dhahran. Both were just after Desert Storm and within 18 months of each other. I spent four months in Kaposvar, Hungary at a Hungarian Air Force base. This was a staging base for the Army before going to and returning from their yearlong assignments Bosnia.

My biggest thrill in the Air Force was doing Space Shuttle weather support at the transatlantic abort landing sites such as Zaragoza, Spain; Banjul, The Gambia; Moron, Spain and Marrakech, Morocco. I was the noncommissioned officer in charge of these support missions which consisted of a four person weather team, all of which was military personnel. We worked side by side with NASA personnel as well as a NASA astronaut. Our mission there was to provide pre-shuttle launch weather observations and sending up radiosondes. The biggest concern was the first 8-1/2 minutes of the shuttle launch because at any one moment, the shuttle could have aborted their flight into space and land at our location. A couple of missions later, I was informed that we were within one failure during launch that the shuttle was close in aborting to my location.

Since my arrival here, I am active with my church and weather does play a part with them. A couple of years ago, our youth group were out camping in Kingman County when a severe thunderstorm was heading their way. I quickly called them and told them they may need to consider packing up to leave. As they left the campsite, hail began falling with a heavy rainshowers. So if the weather goes wrong for their planned event, of course they blame me, but I tell them Mother Nature has her own mind of what she wants to do. I really

don't mind and I guess that I am their personal weatherman. Besides weather, my other hobbies include golf, fishing and NASCAR. I also belong to the Sedgwick County Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) for the past two years.

3. Rob suggested that we need to draft a constitution for our chapter. Our chapter does not have any record of a constitution or by-laws, and should have some guidelines to follow for future members. Rob asked for some volunteers to help draft this constitution. Stephanie Dunten and Lorrie Donham both volunteered for this task. We will keep you updated on our progress in later meetings.

We concluded the short business meeting at 12:20 pm.

Chapter Secretary Mike Smith gave an excellent presentation on his new book "**Warnings - The True Story of How Science Tamed the Weather.**" coming in May. The book tells the story of how meteorology has been more effective at saving lives than cardiology, cancer research or traffic safety during the last 50 years. Rob suggested that we purchase Mike's book for the chapter. We will most likely be voting on this at the next meeting
